Dear Swansea Community Member,

2022 saw a lot of change at the Swansea Police Department. Sgt. John Sury retired in May after 26 years of service. As a result, Det. Gary Reuter was promoted to sergeant. Officer Paul Brault retired in September after 20 years of service. Civilian Police Aide/Evidence Manager Lesnia Gonzales resigned to pursue other opportunities as did CPAs Anais Becker and Logan Laut. In November, Chief Steve Johnson resigned to become the Chief of Police at the Fairview Heights Police Department after 7 years leading our agency. Mayor Leopold and the Village Board subsequently appointed me as the new Chief of Police. With my appointment, Sgt. Keith Howard was promoted to Deputy Chief of Police.

With the aforementioned departures, we added some new faces in the department. Officers Seth Belford joined us from the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. Officer Marquis Jones came to us from the St. Charles County Police Department and Officer Claire Dappen started her career after separating from active duty U.S. Air Force service. Awards

Officer Matt Lindley received the Swansea Police Officer of the Year Award for 2022. This is the third year in a row he has received the award as voted on by his colleagues. Officer Lindley is exceptionally proactive with his police patrols in that he made 52 felony arrests while removing numerous illegal guns and drugs off the street. He handled 568 calls for service, made 426 traffic stops, and effected 93 misdemeanor arrests as well. In addition, he trained two new officers as one of the department's Field Training Officers. He embodies the department's Vision Statement: To set the standard in law enforcement through leadership, innovation, and commitment to excellence in everything we do. Not only is he tough on violent criminals but he knows how to communicate effectively with everyone and turn bad situations into good ones. Officer Lindley is equally proficient handling his calls for service as he is with his criminal enforcement.

Swansea Police Sergeant Breanna Kemper-Damm received the Chief's Certificate of Excellence for her service relating to a suicidal subject. Sgt. Kemper-Damm displayed great empathy and compassion to the despondent person and talked with him at length to convince him his life was important and people cared about him. She convinced him to seek medical and mental assistance and ultimately saved his life.

Swansea Police Officers Matt Lindley and Andrew Hewitt again received the Aggressive Criminal Enforcement Award (ACE) in 2022. The objectives are to increase criminal apprehension and improve traffic safety. Officers are encouraged to use traffic enforcement methods to stop traffic violators and "look beyond the ticket" to detect felonies and other significant crimes and infractions in progress. The program is based on self-initiated activity focused on felony arrests, fugitive apprehension, firearms, drug offenses and recovery of stolen vehicles. Officer Lindley made 42 self-initiated felony arrests and Officer Hewitt had 11 self-initiated felony arrests despite being on special assignment.

Patrol Division

Patrol Squad One

Squad 1 works the 6am to 6pm dayshift. The 2022 Officers of Squad 1 were Officer Paul Brault, Officer Matthew Lindley, Officer Daniel Voelker, and Sergeant Keith Howard to start the year. A significant event of this year is the retirement of Officer Paul Brault who worked his last shift on August 19th, 2022 which completed his 20th year of service to the Village of Swansea. Officer Lindley completed his ninth year with the department, while Officer Voelker completed his eighth year. Officer Lindley and Officer Voelker are two of the department's Field Training Officers and were quite busy throughout the year training new officers on top of their patrol duties.

During the summer of 2022, Deputy Chief Matthew Blomberg was at the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. During this time, I was moved from Squad 1 to the acting Deputy Chief of Police for 10 weeks. During this time, squad one had a senior officer in charge of the squad for most daily tasks. When Officer Brault retired, Officer Marquis Jones joined our patrol squad. Officer Jones was recently hired from a Missouri police department.

Late in the year, Chief Steven Johnson left the department to become the Chief in Fairview Heights. Due to this move, Matthew Blomberg was appointed as the Chief of Police. Chief Blomberg appointed me as the Deputy Chief of Police. Due to this, I was again away from Squad 1 where Officer Lindley was the officer in charge of the shift.

Being without a supervisor for almost half of the year, Squad 1 was able to perform to the same level they always do. This shows the quality of the members of the Squad 1 and why these officers made my job as a patrol supervisor very easy.

Patrol Squad Two

As Hamilton approached, the student looked at him and immediately calmed down some. I asked them if they wanted to pet Hamilton and they shook their head yes, still unable to talk. As they pet Hamilton, he started licking their hands and they immediately started giggling! Seeing this transformation over the course of 30 seconds was wonderful especially when I consider it likely would have been a 10-15 minute ordeal for staff. Within minutes, the student returned to the cafeteria happy and ate their lunch without further breakdown.



Although the transition to continuously having Hamilton with me created some challenges, the rewards far outweigh those challenges and it is definitely worth it! I am looking forward to what 2023 has in store for us!

Civilian Police Aides

2022 brought another year of accomplishments and some challenges for the Civilian Department. Although we had some hurdles, the Civilian Police Aides all worked together to achieve success throughout the year. Civilian Administrative Supervisor Ashley Robbins was out on FMLA during the summer months and the civilian staff all worked in tandem to fill her role to keep the department in successful working order. In addition to other administrative changes, we had big departmental personnel changes which included promoting a new full time evidence technician. Although the civilian department is ever changing, our team works seamlessly to support the mission of the police department. The Civilian Police Aide Department is comprised of Nickolas Thouvenot (Full-Time Evidence Technician), Monica Allen, Danyel Bagby, Hannah Bielke, Myesha Fisher, and Pieter Kok. In 2022 the CPAs handled 3,252 non-emergency calls, 2,862 walk-ins, and reviewed 3,527 reports.

Evidence

2022 was another transitional year for the Swansea Property Room. CPA and Evidence Custodian Lesnia Gonzales departed for new adventures. CPA Nickolas Thouvenot, who has been with the department for over four years, shifted to a full time CPA and agreed to take over the duties of evidence custodian. As evidence custodian CPA Thouvenot will be responsible for the day-to-day upkeep of the property room, including receiving, cataloging, and storing all incoming property. CPA Thouvenot is also tasked with identifying and purging property no longer needed and taking property to, and receiving property back from, the crime lab. Officer Tutterow remains supervisor of the property room ensuring standards and protocol are met.

The Swansea Police Department has long recognized the need for expansion of the property room and 2022 was no exception. The department significantly increased the storage space for property, by more than double, by cordoning off additional space in the department's basement. This is an ongoing process that we hope to complete in 2023 by purchasing shelving and reorganizing the entire property room to move property into the new areas. As there is nearly 14,000 items in storage, this will be a large task.

In 2022, the property room took in 675 items into the property room including car bumpers, realistic-looking airsoft guns, and electric scooters! Due to the department's transition to a cloud-based digital storage system, the number of DVDs and CDs entered into the property room has plummeted to only 76 from a peak of over 1400 in 2016! The Swansea Police Department continues to recognize the importance of evidence storage and handling and will continue to strive for excellence as we upgrade, update, and advance our capabilities into the future.

Criminal Investigations Unit



The Criminal Investigations Unit is comprised of two detectives reporting to the Deputy Chief of Police. Additionally, the Swansea Police Department has one investigator assigned to the St. Clair County Drug Tactical Unit. Detective Reuter was promoted to Sergeant during 2022, which allowed Detective Wilken a position inside of the unit. In 2022, Detectives Frank, Wilken, and DTU Investigator Hewitt had 321 new cases assigned to them in addition to their ongoing investigations. Although many cases were ongoing or pending new leads, the detectives efficiently and effectively cleared a large number of the cases through incredible hard work and diligence.

Swansea PD detectives are active members of the following task forces:

Detective Frank has 17 years of experience and Detective Wilken has 6 years of experience. Investigator Hewitt has 9 years of experience and just completed his third year assigned with the Drug Tactical Unit.

During 2022, Detective Frank, a member of the United States Secret Service Cyber Crimes Task Force, assisted the USSS with the following Investigation:

During 2022, Detective Frank, also completed the following data extractions for our department as well as other departments in the area:

Swansea PD data extractions – 22

Other Agencies data extractions- 13

Detective Wilken obtained his certification as a computer voice stress analyzer (CVSA) in 2022. The CVSA infers deception from stress which is measured in the voice. The CVSA records the human voice using a microphone, and measures the voice information about the physiological and psychological state of the speaker. The CVSA aims to monitor stress in a subject's voice and with high stress on an answer can be an indication of deception. Since being certified, Detective Wilken has assisted on numerous investigations with this technology within our agency.

The Investigations Unit continues to provide superior work and professionalism within our community and this region. The dedication and empathy with which they perform their duties is inspiring and admirable. As crime has evolved and becomes more complex, our detectives continue to learn new skills and techniques to remain at the forefront of criminal investigations. This department and the Village are fortunate to have such exemplary officers in this Unit.

Drug Tactical Unit

During 2022, the St. Clair County Drug Tactical Unit adopted 73 cases from the Swansea Police Department. The cases consisted of narcotics possession and drug sales along with felony weapons offenses. Over \$2.1 million in bail have been issued from 58 arrest warrants. Several of the cases are still pending. Of the Swansea Police Department cases that were submitted to the St. Clair County State's Attorney's Office, over 90% have resulted in criminal charges.

Several of the cases that have been adopted from the Swansea Police Department have led to the identification and successful apprehension of individuals selling narcotics in the St. Clair County area. Two notable cases involved an individual trafficking a large quantity of fentanyl from out of state and the other led to the execution of a search warrant of residence where large amounts of cocaine and crack/cocaine were being sold from. During that search of the residence, a firearm was located that was connected to open homicide in another jurisdiction.


The vast majority of cases that DTU investigated for the Swansea Police Department were the result of proactive police work by Swansea Officers.

Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis

The Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis became operational in 1965 and serves both the Missouri and Illinois greater St. Louis metropolitan area. There are currently eight counties from Illinois participating in this highly skilled and successful unit. Those counties include: Madison, St. Clair, Monroe, Jersey, Macoupin, Bond, Randolph, and Clinton. The MCS investigates the most heinous crimes, primarily homicides, but will activate for other serious crimes. An activation will typically saturate an investigation with 15-20 detectives within the first 24 hours. The MCS boasts an impressive 80% clearance rate and has been nationally and internationally recognized by the FBI National Academy and the International Homicide Investigators' Association. St. Clair County Regional Special Response Team

Officer Schutzbach was assigned to the St. Clair County Regional Special Response Team (SRT) where he serves as an operator. The Special Response Team is a part-time tactical team comprised of officers from the Belleville Police Department, St. Clair County Sheriff's Department, Millstadt Police Department, and the Swansea Police Department. The Team conducts semi-monthly training in the following areas:

- Firearms proficiency and less lethal munitions
- Tactical operations and communications
- Hostage response training
- Search warrant service and execution
- Defensive tactics
- Response to barricaded subjects
- Proficient use of surveillance robots and the Bearcat Armored Vehicle

SRT works closely with the St. Clair County Drug Tactical Unit (DTU) in response to search warrants associated with narcotics and other drug investigations. Additionally, SRT provides mutual aid assistance to the Region 8 ILEAS Teams.

New Equipment

In 2022, the Swansea Police Department purchased much needed safety equipment for officers in the event of an active shooter incident. The equipment consisted of ballistic shields and vest plates, breaching tools, and first aid kits.

We are currently transitioning to the new Taser 7 less lethal weapon as our current Tasers are nearing the end of their service expectancy and will soon be discontinued by the manufacturer. SPD purchased 7 new Tasers this fiscal year.

SPD ordered one new Axon in-car camera system to complete our transition to the Axon recording system, which integrates with our body worn cameras.

The Swansea Police Department remains committed to providing our officers with the best equipment to complete to serve our community to the best of our abilities.

Departmental Training

The Swansea Police Department believes that continued training for officers is of paramount importance. In 2022 officers in the department took part in a variety of training that far exceeds the minimum statutory requirements required by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, Illinois Law (Including the SAFE-T Act), and recommendations from the International Association of Chief's of Police. In fact, this year officers continued with more online training to maximize the amount of training each officer receives annually. This year training increased this year by quite a large amount, specifically due to two command level leadership classes that accounted for over 800 hours. The Swansea Police Department is fully compliant with the minimum standards determined by the State of Illinois. In 2022, officers completed **3,048.76 hours** of documented training, which was 1257.51 more hours than in 2021. Another reason for the large jump in training hours was the relaxing of COVID training protocols. The average training time per officer comes out to over 138.58 hours per officer. The officers attended one hundred and five different classes throughout the year. The following is a list of classes officers attended:

Rapid Deployment Training

On August 2nd and August 3rd the Swansea Police Department hosted rapid deployment training at Wolf Branch Middle School. This training was conducted by trainers from the Illinois State Police, Swansea Police Department, and the Belleville Police Department. This training was for approximately 50 officers from Swansea, Illinois State Police, Belleville, Fairview Heights, and Shiloh Police Departments.



The training focused on preventing or mitigating every officer's worst nightmare, an active school shooter. Officers received four hours of hands on role playing and simunition-based training, in which officers from multiple departments worked together to 'stop the shooting'. Simunitions training involves live fire weapons of small paint projectiles to "simulate" real life gunshots. Officers learned how to work with other officers from different agencies just like they would in a real world event.

Officers learned techniques from the Illinois State Police SWAT Team and incorporated the training they learned in several simunition-based scenarios. Officers used communications and worked with local ambulance service personnel just as they would in a real world event.

This training is invaluable to our officers in the instance they would have a situation like this unfold in our area where we would respond. This training also helped officers meet the new training mandates from the SAFE-T Act requiring officers to complete hands on and reality-based training.
